4-H PROGRAM

RULES & REGULATIONS Adoption of Rules

The Evergreen State Fairgrounds, hereinafter referred to as Fair, is a division of Snohomish County government. The fairground facility operates year-round with a full-time staff of Twenty-Two. Each year special emphasis is given to the agricultural exhibits, as agriculture is one of Washington State's largest industries. Exhibitors are encouraged to showcase all aspects of the agriculture industry of yesterday, today and tomorrow. Information and programs are available to all citizens without discrimination regarding "race; sex; gender; sexual orientation; gender identity; gender expression; religion; age; color; creed; national or ethnic origin; citizenship; physical, mental, or sensory ability; genetic information; and/or status as an honorably discharged veteran or member of the military.". Fair management is authorized to adopt and interpret such rules and regulations as it deems necessary for the safe and orderly operation of the annual fair. This year's theme is **The Evergreen State Fair... Where the Magic Comes Alive in 2025!** Good luck on your Fair adventure!

The strength of the 4-H Program lies in its volunteer adult and teen leaders, who are energetic, enthusiastic, and dedicated to helping young people. Over 300 volunteers and 800 youth in Snohomish County experienced the 4-H program annually. The 4-H Volunteers and members are supported in their efforts by the faculty and staff of the Washington State University Extension office in Willis Tucker Park, in Snohomish.

Objectives for 4-H participation at the Evergreen State Fair are to provide, in a friendly but competitive setting, ...

- an educational experience relating to projects and activities
- an opportunity for developing personal skills, sportsmanship, leadership, and responsibility
- an opportunity for 4-H members to apply their acquired knowledge and skill
- recognition of youth for their comprehension of the many facets of their project(s)
- opportunities to broaden relationships among 4-H and FFA members and programs
- a comprehensive view of 4-H and its importance in the community

GENERAL RULES & INFORMATION

The following rules and regulations apply to all non-commercial exhibitors/exhibits participating in the current year's fair; exhibitors are required to familiarize themselves with them. Fair management reserves the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and regulations.

GROUNDS SUPERVISION

- The general supervision of the grounds and the entire exhibition are vested in Fair management.
- Outside agencies are contracted to provide medical care, traffic control and law enforcement during the annual fair.
- Property of the Fair (i.e., flower baskets, landscape materials, fire extinguishers) may not be removed.

ADMISSIONS AND TRAFFIC

- The east and west pass gates will open at 9:30 am for Fair participants. The green (livestock) and white (equestrian) gates will open at 7:00 am. The outside pedestrian gates of the FAIR open at 10:00 am daily for the public. Admission prices are posted at entrance gates.
- Vehicles, including automobiles, trucks, recreational vehicles, trailers, golf carts, motor scooters, bicycles, etc., are not allowed inside barns or on lawns at any time.
- Overnight parking is allowed only in Fair RV Lots or as provided in writing by Fair management. Reference RV/Car Reservation Form at the back of this book. As of Aug. 1, only cash, cashier's checks, money orders or VISA/MC will be accepted. A \$35 service fee will be charged for all NSF checks. Premiums may be withheld until all NSF charges and/or entry fees are cleared.
- Area traffic/parking signs are to always be observed. Designated fire lanes must be kept clear.
- Multi-Day parking tickets are available in advance using the reservation form on the Website or at the Fair Pass Booth #201).

GROUNDS & BUILDING USE

- All 4-H exhibitors must be off the interior grounds by 11:00 pm daily. 4-H exhibitors who remain on the exterior grounds overnight must be accompanied by parent/guardian or an adult chaperone arranged by the parent/guardian.
- Buildings and barns are off limits to exhibitors after 11:00 pm
- Smoking is prohibited on the Evergreen State Fairgrounds. Possession of alcoholic beverages, illegal controlled substances, firearms or lethal weapons is prohibited.
- Overnight sleeping is not allowed in any building or barn.

SKATEBOARDS, SCOOTERS, ETC

- NO skateboards, roller skates, roller blades, bicycles, motorcycles, scooters or similar recreational vehicles or toys are allowed on the grounds.

4-H STAGE SCHEDULING

- Use of the stage in the 4-H building, by any 4-H participant, must be requested in advance. This includes style revues, bowls, performing arts, demonstrations, shows, award presentations, etc.
- Time slots available on a first come, first serve basis.

STATE 4-H FAIR

4-H Exhibitors who qualify are eligible to enter at the Washington State Fair which hosts the State 4-H Fair. DOGS AND OTHER PETS

- Dogs, birds, or other pets not intended for exhibition will be denied entry to the fairgrounds. Please leave your animal at home for its own protection, except for on duty police dogs, "assistant" animals (as defined by ADA), trained animals in scheduled performances and dogs entered in competition.
- Animals are not allowed in restrooms or showers.

ADVERTISING AND SALES

- No person will be permitted to distribute advertising matter, handbills, fliers or herald upon the grounds.
- The tacking or posting of any advertisement, bill, sign, banner, etc. is prohibited.
- Advertising and Sales – sales, solicitations, commercial product display, raffles, drawings, etc., by any entity on the Fairgrounds is prohibited, except as authorized by a written license agreement issued by Fair Management.

HOLD HARMLESS AND NON-LIABILITY

- EXHIBITOR'S RISK – Exhibits at the Fair are entered and displayed at the risk of the exhibitor. Fair cannot accept responsibility of loss or damage resulting from conditions imposed by large crowds, the arrangement of the displays, the great number of exhibits, disease, weather or any other condition.
- Prior to entry, exhibitor should consider the sentimental and monetary value of the exhibit as Fair provides no restitution for loss or damage.
- HOLD HARMLESS – By submitting an entry into the Fair, Exhibitor has agreed to protect, save harmless, indemnify, and defend, at their own expense, Snohomish County, its elected and appointed officials, officers, employees, and agents from any loss or claim for damages solely caused by the negligence or willful misconduct of Snohomish County, its elected and appointed officials, officers, employees, or agents; and that Snohomish County shall not be held liable or responsible for any loss, injury and damage to persons, animals or property on the fairgrounds by reason of fire, theft, vandalism, weather, wind, flood, earthquake, collision damage, disease or illness, nor does it assume any liability for injury to persons, animals or property while on any portion of the fairgrounds or while using its facilities (S.C.C. 2.33.060).

FORFEITURE OF PRIVILEGES OR AWARDS

- Any person who violates any general or special rule will forfeit all privileges and premiums and be subject to such penalty as Fair management may order.

BANKING – CHECK CASHING SERVICES are not available on the fairgrounds.

- Automated Teller Machines (ATM) are located at various sites on the fairgrounds.

DEPARTMENTS OF EXHIBITION

DURATION OF STAY

- All exhibits must remain on display as individual department schedules stipulate.
- Exhibits must be ready for public viewing daily between the hours of 10:00 am and 9:00 pm

ENTRY OF EXHIBIT

- Entry of exhibits is allowed during the dates and times specified in the individual department sections of this book.
- All exhibits must be entered for competition in the name of the owner or maker whose number must be endorsed on the entry form.
- Anyone attempting to deceive the judge regarding ownership, or who shall purchase articles or borrow them to exhibit in his or her name, shall forfeit all claims as an exhibitor.
- Fair management reserves the right to accept entries later if it is found such action would not cause injury to other exhibitors.

OBJECTIONABLE EXHIBIT

- Fair management reserves the right to remove from display area any exhibit or animal that may be falsely entered, or in Fair management's opinion may be deemed unsuitable or objectionable, without assigning a reason, therefore.

ERRONEOUS ENTRY

- Exhibits that have been erroneously entered may be transferred to the proper division/class/lot prior to judging. If such classes have been judged, however, they shall not be reopened. No animal shall be changed from one class to another after closing dates unless it is ineligible for the class in which it is entered. All determinations are at the department Superintendent's discretion.

DETERMINATION OF PRIZE WINNERS

- Where there is no competition and/or where there are fewer animals or articles in a class than the number of premiums offered, the Judge and Superintendent, at their discretion, may award a prize or prizes of such rank as the animal or article deserves.
- Awards will be marked as to meaning and will be made according to the merits of the exhibit. The judge may disqualify or award blue, red, or white premiums at his/her discretion. Special awards will be made only after the judge has agreed with department Superintendent that such award should be made.
- Where there is one exhibit in a class, the award shall be made on merit alone and a premium, or no premium, may be awarded. An animal or article without merit shall not be awarded a premium; and premiums shall not be awarded merely because there is no competition.
- The Danish system of award is used in the 4-H Division. Upon request, department Superintendent will provide information on specific judging/award system by division/class.
- Prizewinners shall be determined by reference to the judge/clerking sheets. The department Superintendent and judge signature certifies the placing to be correct.

DEPARTMENT SUPERINTENDENT

- All 4-H Division superintendents are currently enrolled 4-H Volunteers. Each department Superintendent, under the direction of Fair management and staff, shall have charge of the department to which he/she may be assigned. Exhibitors will follow the order and direction of the superintendent. If the order of the superintendent differs from the rules and regulations in this book, Superintendent will provide exhibitor with verification of Fair management approval for deviation from rules.
- Superintendent has the authority to recommend to Fair management reduced premiums when rule violations and/or disciplinary problems exist.
- Superintendent has the right to request certificates of registration and transfer and examine same before the prizes and premiums are awarded, and to notify the judge that the exhibitor has complied with these requirements.
- The Superintendent is not allowed, under any circumstances, to permit exhibitor access to display cases.

DEPARTMENT CLERK

- It is the department clerk's responsibility to make a note of all cases where registration or entry blanks are not satisfactory to the Superintendent and to indicate same on the judges' report sheets.
- Clerks are prohibited from allowing anyone, except the department Superintendent, to examine the department records while judging is in progress.
- Clerk or judge will announce the placing of the entry after adjudication of each class. When required, judge will give reason for placing.
- Clerk is not permitted, under any circumstances, to allow the entry/clerking sheets to go from his/her possession to be inspected by anyone, nor shall an entry be made known by the clerk until the entry sheets are placed in the hands of the Superintendent.

JUDGES

- The judges in all departments will be approved by Fair management. No one will be allowed to act as a judge in the class or ring in which he/she exhibits.

• The decision of the judges will be final in all cases, except where mistake, fraud, misrepresentation, or collusion, not discovered at the time of the award, is proven. In such cases, Fair management will make the decision.

- All judges participating in 4-H classes will view the "Judges Material provided in your packet prior to judging.
- Judges' names are public information. Following judging of exhibits the judge's names may be disclosed upon request. Fair reserves the right to substitute judges as needed.

PROTESTS AND APPEALS

- All protests and appeals must be made in writing and accompanied by a deposit of \$25.00 cash only. This deposit will be forfeited if protest/appeal is not sustained. Said document must state plainly the cause of complaint or appeal and must be filed with Fair manager within 24 hours after cause of protest/appeal. Submit written complaint in the Fair Administration Office (bldg. #405).
- Appeals from the decision of a judge or department Superintendent must be made in writing and must contain at least one specific charge stating at length the facts relied upon or the rule violated, and naming witnesses and their addresses by which proof is too made.
- When a protest is to be made against the competition of an animal or article in any class, notice of same shall be filed with the department Superintendent before the class is passed upon, so the judge may be instructed to place a reserve award in order that premiums may be properly distributed in the event of the protest being sustained.
- No complaint or appeal based upon the statement that the judge or judges are incompetent or have overlooked an animal or article will be considered by Fair management.
- All questions of dispute or differences not provided for under the rules and regulations shall be referred to Fair management whose decision shall be final.
- In addition to the right of protest therein guaranteed to exhibitors, Fair management reserves the right to take cognizance of fraud consummated or attempted in connection with an exhibit and take such action as may be deemed just and proper.

DRESS CODE

- Body cleanliness, neat attire and adherence to the Snohomish County 4-H code of conduct are required while involved with any 4-H activities. Appropriate *showing* attire shall be worn at all times when actively participating in the show.
- See individual project for specific dress guidelines.

EXHIBITOR TICKETS

- Eligible 4-H exhibitor will contact club leader to order exhibitor (season) and worker-volunteer (one-day) tickets. Reference the fee information on the Fair's website for current year rates. Evergreenfair.org
- 4-H Identification Cards cannot be used as admission or parking authorization.

AWARDS

The judges will award prizes and premiums only on articles, divisions and classes listed in this book. An error in the record of premiums and prizes awarded, caused by oversight or neglect on the part of the Superintendent or judge, shall be subject to correction by Fair manager.

MONETARY PREMIUMS

- Each department in this book outlines premium amounts or points applicable to divisions/classes and lots. If, for any reason such as war, rain or any act of God beyond the control of Fair, the income for the current year of the Fairgrounds shall be impaired, all prizes, premiums, and awards will be pro-rated accordingly.

PREMIUM AMOUNTS

- Superintendents recommend, and Fair management approves, the number of points allowed and the flat premium amounts within each department. They are analyzed and determinations made based on what is in the best interest of the exhibitor, Snohomish County and Fair.

PREMIUM WARRANTS (checks)

- Warrants (checks) for premiums will be mailed to exhibitor by the 31st day of October.
- ANY INCORRECT OR MISSING PREMIUM CHECKS MUST BE REPORTED BY NOVEMBER 30TH.

REQUESTS FOR MISSING CHECKS WILL NOT BE PROCESSED AFTER DECEMBER 31ST. A first check has to have been issued.

- Questions regarding the detailed amounts paid should be directed to the applicable department Superintendent.
- To avoid delays in processing premiums, exhibitor is responsible for completing all areas of the Entry Form that apply. It is mandatory that the *Exhibitor ID*, *Exhibitor Name* and complete *address* are typed or printed legibly on the Entry Form. **W9 form required for Horse, Beef, Dairy Cattle, Swine and Sheep entries.**
- Premium warrants (checks) are void 90 days after date of issuance. After that date, checks become null & void and premiums are forfeited.**
- No Checks \$5.00 or under will be processed.**
- LOST premium warrants may be replaced after completing the process: (1) Call or come to Fair administration to request a "Lost Warrant Affidavit" form (2) Complete for (3) Mail or deliver form to the Snohomish County Administration Building, Department of Budget and Finance, 3000 Rockefeller Ave., Everett, WA 98201.

RIBBONS/ROSETTES

- Awards will be designated by ribbons and rosettes in colors as specified:
Excellent.....Blue
Good.....Red
Fair.....White

OTHER AWARDS

- Refer to individual department for information on special and sponsored awards.

PUBLIC SAFETY

FIRE PROTECTION

- All matters of fire protection are under the direct supervision of the State and County Fire Marshal offices. The Fair will use precaution to guard against fire but will not be responsible for any loss or damage suffered by such event.

FIRST AID

- Under no circumstances shall an individual attempt to treat a person that is "down". In the case of a medical situation exhibitor shall immediately contact the nearest department Superintendent, clerk or Fair employee. They are responsible for making the appropriate contacts.
- Exhibitor may help situation further by keeping the area cleared until medical assistance arrives.
- The First Aid Office is available to all exhibitors and patrons during public hours of the fair. Report to building #407 for assistance.

LAW ENFORCEMENT AND SECURITY

- The Snohomish County Sheriff's Office is contracted to provide security and crowd control on the fairgrounds. They are based in Temp Trailer #407 next to the Administration Building.

LOST PERSON CENTER

- All persons who are lost or have misplaced another person may contact the Lost Person Center operated by Valley General Hospital. Center is located behind building #300.

LOST AND FOUND

- The Lost and Found department is open in the West Gate Pass Booth Building #201 from 8:00 am – 10:00 pm
- Owner may claim item by verbally identifying it, prior to viewing, in the West Gate Pass Booth #201 after Labor Day in the Fairgrounds Administration Office Building #405.
- The Fair office will retain lost/found items beginning Labor Day for a period of (30) thirty days.

NON-ANIMAL DEPARTMENT RULES

ENTRY

- Entries are accepted after completion of online entry. Items are accepted during the times printed within each department schedule.
- Exhibits that are wet or tacky to the touch will NOT be accepted. Exhibitor will complete exhibit within a timeline that virtually guarantees an intact exhibit.
- On entering an exhibit, an Entry Tag will be furnished which contains all data pertinent to the exhibitor and exhibit. This tag must be attached to exhibit according to the direction of the Superintendent or Department Clerk. Exhibitor will be given a stub from the entry tag.
- EXHIBITOR IS REQUIRED TO PRESENT ENTRY TAG STUB TO SUPERINTENDENT OR CLERK PRIOR TO RELEASE OF ENTRY.**

RELEASE OF EXHIBIT

- All exhibits must remain intact until the release time specified in each department. Failure to comply with this requirement will cause forfeiture of premiums and awards won in any department of the Fair.
- It is the sole responsibility of the owner to retrieve exhibit. Reference individual department for release times.
- Exhibits displayed in the 4-H Building will be released on Tuesday, September 3, 2024, from 12:00 noon to 7:00 pm in the 4-H Building. The Fair is not responsible for items left after this time.

LIVESTOCK DEPARTMENT INFORMATION & RULES

ELIGIBILITY

- A 4-H exhibitor will not be permitted to exhibit products or livestock from the same enterprise or project in both 4-H and FFA divisions.
- Livestock co-owned by more than one exhibitor must be entered under one owner only. Livestock CANNOT be cross entered under different owners, farms, or business names.
- Cross entries will forfeit all prizes and premiums.
- Examples of Project or Enterprise: beef breeding, beef marketing, sheep breeding, sheep marketing, swine breeding, swine marketing, production dairy cow, dairy heifer and calf, poultry breeding, poultry marketing, horse breeding and production, horse performance, vegetable gardening, container gardening, home horticulture, etc.
- Examples of Enterprise: chickens, turkeys, geese, rabbits, sheep, swine, beef, dairy replacements, dairy productions, grains, etc.
- Refer to the appropriate term used by both organizations.
- Livestock or animals, for purposes of these rules, are defined as all breeds of beef cattle, dairy cattle, swine, sheep, horses, dairy goats, pygmy goats, fiber goats, poultry, fowl, rabbits, cavies, dogs, cats, and llamas.
- Livestock ownership certificates for dairy goats, dairy cows, and horses must be on file with their 4-H Program by the deadline outlined in the WA State 4-H Policies and Procedures. (EM0758)
- Horse and dog entries are restricted to Snohomish County 4-H members only.
- Tractor Driving Contest. 4-H exhibitors must have a permission form signed by parent and 4-H leader. Exhibitor must have had prior tractor driving experience approved by 4-H leader. Limited to intermediates and seniors. Awards given during the Dairy Cattle Awards.

ENTRY AND ADMISSION OF LIVESTOCK and ANIMALS

- **Entries are accepted on a first come basis. Space is limited so get your entry forms to the Superintendent quickly.**
- Entries are accepted after submittal of on-line entry ShoWorks on-line, and a health examination of the animal. A separate entry form is required for each department. **W9 form required for Horse, Beef, Dairy Cattle, Swine and Sheep entries.** Entries may also be done on-line.
- Livestock may be unloaded at the fairgrounds during times listed in the department schedule and enter barn after seen by the Fair Vet. Livestock arriving outside those times listed will not be permitted in the barns until checked by a veterinarian. Owners will be charged a service call fee for the veterinarian to health check the animal prior to admission outside of Fair Veterinarian scheduled hours.

HEALTH INSPECTION - VETERINARIAN

All livestock/animal exhibits presented for entry to the facilities are required to pass a health examination by Evergreen State Fair contracted Veterinarians during established inspection times of each department. The extent of examination is to be determined by the Veterinarian and with the following information:

1. No animal from a quarantined area or premise will be permitted to enter the Fairgrounds.
2. The Fair Veterinarian's professional decision as to the health status of an animal is final and Fair management will uphold such decisions.
3. At the discretion of the Superintendent or Fair Management, any animal that will not stand or endangers the Veterinarian, exhibitor, public, or other exhibitors, during the examination will be immediately removed from the grounds.
4. The Evergreen State Fair and the State of Washington establish exhibit health standards for the safety and overall health of all exhibits. The health and conditions of the animal are critical for both public perception and proper education to the public.
5. Refer to the individual departments for vaccination requirements.

INTERSTATE - HEALTH REQUIREMENTS

Washington State livestock requires no vaccinations or tests for entering and individual health certificates are not required on Washington State animals - except as indicated below.

BOVINE - SPECIFIC HEALTH REQUIREMENTS

- All eligible animals 10 months or older must have been vaccinated against Brucellosis. It is strongly recommended that cattle be vaccinated within the last three months against respiratory diseases.
- Any animal whose owner cannot produce evidence of vaccination, in the form of a tattoo, must have a negative official Brucellosis test done through a State or Federal laboratory within 90 days prior to the opening of Fair.
- A respiratory complex vaccine is strongly recommended.
- Recommended cattle vaccines are IBR, BVD, P13, and BRSV Viral vaccines at least 2 weeks prior to showing at Fair.
- An 8-way Clostridial vaccine is also highly recommended.

SPECIFIC HEALTH INFORMATION - OTHER SPECIES

The following vaccinations are strongly recommended (but not required) by the Snohomish County Veterinary Medical Association:

CATS: Feline distemper and Rabies vaccination every three years.

HORSES: Tetanus toxoid, influenza vaccine, Eastern and Western Encephalomyelitis, Equine Rhinopneumonitis, and a mixed bacterin injection are advised yearly. It is recommended that these vaccinations be given at least four to six weeks prior to Fair and no sooner than 2 weeks prior to showing.

SWINE: Bordetella, Erysipelas, Pasteur Ella, Leptospirosis and Parvovirus vaccinations.

DOGS: It is mandatory that all dogs be vaccinated against rabies. Copies of the official 4-H Rabies Certificate signed by a veterinarian must be on file prior to the fair. Dogs will be checked daily for fleas. Infested dogs will be excused from the dog area until the situation is remedied. Puppies must be at least 16 weeks old to attend Fair.

INTERSTATE - HEALTH REQUIREMENTS

Out of state cattle, sheep rams over six months of age and swine must call and get an Entry Permit. 360-902-1878 8am – 5pm after hours 188-942-1035 or website: <https://fortress.wa.gov/agr/apps/EntryPermit> Out-of-state animal entries must comply with State of Washington import regulations.

- Entry permits numbers are required for all out of state cattle and breeder and feeder swine.
- All out of state animals must have a health certificate listing official individual identification on all dairy cattle and beef cattle over 18 months of age.
- Ownership inspection (brand) from the state of origin prior to entering to fair.

CATTLE – All rodeo, show or exhibition cattle must have: An entry permit, a CVI listing Individual official identification for all animals listed. Required test results and statements listed on the CVI:

Exhibition or show animals Virgin bulls under 18 mo. old require a virgin bull statement. Bulls 18 mo. or older require negative trichomoniasis test results • Brucellosis and tuberculosis test results if applicable. Enclosed are the mandatory import and livestock inspection requirements for entry to Washington fairs. Because individual fairs may apply more stringent regulations, exhibitors should contact fair management before an event for details regarding deadlines, required paperwork, fees, rules, etc.

All female cattle over 4 mo. old require brucellosis vaccination and a legible tattoo. All bulls 18 mo. old or older must test negative for trichomoniasis within the last 60 days. Exhibition or dairy cattle: All female cattle over 4 mo. old require brucellosis vaccination and a legible tattoo. All bulls 18 mo. old or older must test negative for trichomoniasis within the last 60 days.

All bulls and heifers 12 mo. old or older require a negative tuberculosis test within 60 days. All females over 20 mo. old require a negative brucellosis test.

All bulls over 6 mo. old require a negative brucellosis test. All cattle over 12 mo. old require a negative tuberculosis test within 60 days. All cattle over 6 mo. old require a negative brucellosis test within 30 days. All cattle not vaccinated for brucellosis may enter a Washington fair and return to Canada if that fair's rules allow non-vaccinates to be exhibited. All cattle intended to be sold at a fair and/or do not return to Canada must be vaccinated for brucellosis with legible tattoo and "CAN" branded

GOATS – All goats must have: Official individual identification for all intact breeding animals Wethers 18 mo. old or older a CVI stating the animals are free from clinical signs or known exposure to any infectious or contagious disease including, but not limited to, foot rot, sore mouth, and caseous lymphadenitis.

Animal health testing requirements: Dairy goats entering Washington for show or exhibition purposes and returning to their home state are exempt from testing requirements. Female dairy goats 6 mo. old or older must have negative test results for brucellosis and tuberculosis within 30 days if being sold in Washington.

Scrapie Rule WAC 16-89 - All breeds or crosses are required to be tagged with Washington State tamper proof scrapie's tag. Market lambs excluded. Any black-faced ram offered for sale requires a genotype test for scrapie and must show a test result of QR or RR at the 171 Condon. Goats traveling, sold, or shown without registration papers require an official scrapie tag, or a tattoo which lists the entire scrapie flock ID and individual animal ID; for example, WAABC 001 or WA1234001. WA livestock markets request that all goats be tagged. Castrated sheep and castrated goats under 18 months of age do not require a scrapie id, however most WA markets, fairs, and other areas of commerce require identification

HORSES – All horses must have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection or extended equine certificate of veterinary inspection (EECVI) o A negative Coggins test for all horses over 6 mo. old for equine infectious anemia (EIA) within 12 months of entry into Washington State. All horses are required to have an ownership inspection (brand) from the state of origin prior to entering the Fair.

POULTRY – All poultry and exotic fowl (peacocks, guinea fowl, and game birds) are required to have: • A CVI or a USDA NPIP VS Form 9-3 All other birds including psittacine are required to have: • Individual identification via a numbered leg band or manner appropriate to the species.

A CVI including the following statement: "To the best of my knowledge, the birds listed on this certificate are not infected with virulent Newcastle disease, psittacosis, or avian influenza and have been free from clinical signs of or known exposure to infectious or communicable disease during the past 30 days." Avian health testing requirements.

All chickens and game birds must: Originate from an NPIP flock meeting pullorum-typhoid and avian influenza classification requirements OR • Test negative for pullorum-typhoid and avian influenza within 30 days prior to entry into Washington. All waterfowl must: Originate from an NPIP flock meeting avian influenza classification requirements OR test negative for avian influenza within 30 days prior to entry into Washington. All turkeys must: Originate from an NPIP flock meeting pullorum-typhoid, avian influenza, Mycoplasma Gallisepticum, and Mycoplasma Synoviae classification requirements, OR test negative for pullorum-typhoid, avian influenza, Mycoplasma Gallisepticum, and Mycoplasma Synoviae within 30 days prior to entry into Washington.

IN STATE POULTRY USDA - NPIP VS Form 9-3 or a certificate of veterinary inspection within 30 days prior to entry and must not be coming from an area that is under State or Federal restrictions. All other birds, including exotic fowl, pigeons, and doves, require a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection that contains the following statement.

"To the best of my knowledge, the birds listed on this certificate are not infected with exotic Newcastle disease, psittacosis, or avian influenza and have been free from clinical signs of or known exposure to infectious or communicable disease during the past thirty days."

NPIP requirements: All chickens, exotic fowl, and game birds must test negative for Pullorum-Typhoid within 90 days prior to exhibition.

Waterfowl, doves, and pigeons are exempt from this rule. Exhibitors are exempt from this rule if they are members of the National Poultry Improvement Program. • If you have any poultry-related exhibition questions, please contact the Washington State Avian Health program at 509-607-4974 or avhealth@agr.wa.gov. All turkey must originate from an NPIP participant flock that has met Pullorum-Typhoid, Avian Influenza, Mycoplasma Gallisepticum and Mycoplasma Synoviae classification requirements or has tested negative for Pullorum-Typhoid, Avian Influenza, Mycoplasma Gallisepticum and Mycoplasma Synoviae within 30 days prior to entry.

Veterinarian, vet tech or trained personnel can draw ½ cc of blood from each bird and send the samples to WSU Avian Health and Food Safety Laboratory in Puyallup. A WDSA field Veterinarian can perform PT testing at the Fair.

SHEEP – All sheep must have: • Official individual identification for all breeding animals and wethers 18 mo. old or older. • An entry permit for breeding rams over 6 mo. old • A CVI stating: o The animals are free from clinical signs or known exposure to any infectious or communicable disease including, but not limited to, foot rot, sore mouth, and caseous lymphadenitis o The animals originate from a flock in which scrapie has not been diagnosed in the past five years or are from a flock enrolled in the USDA Voluntary Scrapie Flock Certification Program • Animal health test results. Sheep entering Washington for show or exhibition purposes and returning to their home state are exempt from testing requirements. o Breeding rams 6 mo. or older require a negative ELISA test for Brucella ovis within 60 days before entering Washington State; and must be palpated and certified free of any evidence of epididymitis if being sold in Washington.

Goats traveling, sold, or shown without registration papers require an official scrapie tag, or a tattoo which lists the entire scrapie flock ID and individual animal ID; for example, WAABC 001 or WA1234001. WA livestock markets request that all goats be tagged. Castrated sheep and castrated goats under 18 months of age do not require a scrapie id, however most WA markets, fairs, and other areas of commerce require identification

SWINE – Official individual identification on all pigs of any age • A CVI issued within 30 days before arrival in Washington stating, "To the best of my knowledge, swine represented on this certificate have not originated from a premise known to be affected by Porcine Epidemic Diarrhea virus (PEDv) and have not been exposed to PEDv within the last 30 days." • An entry permit number. All swine leaving the farm of origin, passing through livestock markets or collection facilities, or participating in exhibitions must have USDA-approved identification.

FREE USDA-approved electronic ID tags and applicators for Washington fairs and youth exhibitors.

ALPACAS & LLAMAS – All alpacas and llamas are required to have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection stating the animals are free from clinical signs or known exposure to any infectious or communicable disease.

RABBITS - There are many strains of the RHD virus, but three are of most concern. RHD Type 1 has two forms, RHDV and RHDVa. RHD Type 2 has just one form, RHDV2. The two forms of Type 1 are quite similar, and their vaccines are cross-protective. They tend to not affect young bunnies but have a very high mortality rate for adult rabbits. RHDV2, on the other hand, seems less deadly than the Type 1 strains, but affects all ages of rabbits. The RHDV2 vaccine only protects against that type. RHD is not a zoonotic disease and there is no public health significance. RHD is specific to rabbits. May act as carriers like vehicles, shoes and equipment can.

Show/fair management will need to establish policies for exhibitors who wish to attend their show. It is up to each rabbit show's management to evaluate their risks and decide what parameters they would like to establish and enforce

REJECTION OF ANIMAL/LIVESTOCK

- Any exhibit with indications of infectious or contagious diseases, ectoparasites or conditions will be rejected. Exhibitors are aware that ringworm, warts, pinkeye, strangles, contagious ecthyma, hoof rot, scabies, lice, mites, ticks, and fleas fall into these categories.
- The Fair Veterinarian will reject animals showing indications of disease symptoms during the Fair, and when necessary, exhibitor may be instructed to remove animal from exhibit area.

ADJUDICATION OF CLASSES

- No person will be permitted in the ring while stock is being judged except the judge and necessary attendants. Any person interfering with the judges during their adjudication will forfeit the right to premiums. All officers are required, and exhibitors requested to report any violation of this rule to Fair management.

STALL/PEN/CAGE OCCUPANCY

- The department superintendent is solely responsible for assignment of exhibit space within barns, except where otherwise noted. Completed entry form(s) and fee must be submitted to Superintendent prior to assignment of space.
- Under no circumstances will an animal, unless it is entered in a livestock department, or authorized for exhibition, be allowed to occupy a stall or pen until all exhibition animals are accommodated. After said animals have been provided for, should there be any available stalls or pens; exhibitor may make application to superintendent to occupy space.
- Bedding resources are getting difficult to obtain; the Fair will be notifying you of new Policy & Procedures for bedding.

DISPLAY OF LIVESTOCK

- All animals must remain un-blanketed from 10:00am until 9:00pm on each day of the fair. The only exception is the day the animals are groomed for judging, and judging day when they may be blanketed prior to the show. Contact department superintendent for further clarification.

LIVESTOCK EXHIBITOR - CODE OF ETHICS

Believing it is in the best interest of all breeders of all livestock to maintain a reputation of integrity and to continue to present a wholesome and progressive image in the show ring, management lists herewith those practices which are considered unacceptable in presenting livestock at Fair. The use of such practices or procedures is, therefore, considered unethical in the showing of livestock at the Evergreen State Fair.

The following practices are not allowed:

1. Misrepresenting the age of the animal for the class in which it is shown.
2. Treating or massaging any part of the body internally or externally with an irritant, counter-irritant, or other substance to temporarily straighten a weak back or loin, or to produce unnatural animation.

3. Minimizing the effects of cramping by feeding or injecting drugs, depressants or applying packs or using artificial contrivance or therapeutic treatment exempting normal exercise.
4. Striking the animal to cause swelling in a depressed area.
5. Surgery of any kind performed to change the natural process or growth, maturation, contour or appearance of any animal, including teeth. The removal of teats or horns, clipping and dressing hair and trimming of hooves is allowed.
6. Insertion of foreign material under the skin.
7. Any attempt to change natural color of an animal, either purebred or crossbred, by changing the color or adding false hair, fleece or skin at any point, spot or area of the animal's body.
8. The use of alcoholic beverages in the feed or administered as a drench.
9. Administration of drugs of any kind or description, internally or externally prior to entering the show ring, except for treating a recognized disease or injury and for the tranquilization of bulls that may otherwise be dangerous to females in heat.
10. Balancing the udder by any abnormal means including the use of a mechanical contrivance or the injection of fluid or drugs.
11. Treating or massaging the udder or its attachments with an irritant or counterirritant. The use of common products such as fly spray, ointment or liniment in excess to the extent that irritation occurs unless required to reduce edema at the time of calving.

The term "drug" shall mean any substance, the sole possession or use of which is controlled by license under Federal, State or local laws or regulations and by any substance commonly used by the medical or veterinary professions. The use of any chemical and/or compound that is not approved by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) for use in meat producing animals, and the illegal use of approved chemicals and/or compounds are prohibited. All animals shall be subject to tests (blood, urine and/or tissue) for foreign substances that exceed the acceptable levels established by the United States Department of Agriculture, or the FDA. A positive test may result in disqualification, forfeiture of premiums and/or awards.

BARN OCCUPANCY

- All decorative materials must be fire retardant. Official E.S.F. Open Class stall card must be displayed in decorating theme.
- Electrical equipment and appliances used by exhibitors shall be properly shielded, grounded, if necessary, for safe operation; and all electrical cords shall be in good condition, without breaks in insulation. All electrical plugs shall have covers to insulate wire or connections from receptacle faces.
- Such precautions shall be the responsibility of the user, but Fair may inspect at any time all electrical equipment and may impound, for the duration of the Fair, any equipment considered unsafe.
- Smoking is prohibited throughout the fairground.
- Building/barn occupancy is prohibited, to exhibitors and the public, between 12:00am and 5:00am. Exceptions may be made by the department superintendent in the case of animals under a veterinarian's care.

VEHICLE TRAFFIC

- Traffic in the vicinity of show buildings and barns will move one direction during times of entry and release.
- Multi-Day parking tickets available in advance at the Fair Pass Booth (bldg. #202).

LIVESTOCK TRAILER PARKING There is FREE livestock and horse trailer parking DESIGNATED area assigned by Fair.

- Livestock trailers used to haul animals during the current fair season are not allowed to park in RV parking areas.

HERDSMANSHIP

- Exhibitors will be required to keep their spaces and stalls clean by removing any trash, litter or soiled bedding, and place it in designated area.
- Exhibitor is responsible for supplying all tools associated with Herdsmanship including but not limited to wheelbarrow, shovel and pitchfork.
- All animals and stalls must be presentable to the public during public hours (10:00am to 10:00pm daily).

FEED & BEDDING

- Exhibitor is required to provide all feed for livestock and animals on exhibit. Feed must be stored in rodent proof container.
- In most cases feeders and mangers are provided by Fair. Verify availability with department superintendent.
- Bedding resources are getting difficult to obtain; the Fair Management will notify you of new Policy & Procedures for bedding.

VETERINARIAN-CLIENT RELATIONSHIP

- Twice daily, Fair Veterinarian will make onsite service calls to respond to animals listed on the "Vet Check List".
- Any expenses incurred regarding the examination and/or treatment of any animal exhibited at the Evergreen State Fair will be the sole responsibility of the owner of said animal.

TIME OF CLASSES/SHOWS In as much as possible, the schedule set forth in the individual departments will be followed. Fair management reserves the right to alter or cancel schedules as required by circumstances.

RELEASE OF LIVESTOCK

- Exhibitor may remove livestock on exhibit only at the times set forth in the individual department schedule. Removal or withdrawal of animal/livestock prior to release time will cause forfeiture of premiums and awards won in any department of the Fair unless approved by Department Superintendent & Superintendent Coordinator.

ANIMAL ACTIVIST ALERT

- At all times exhibitors shall be aware of suspicious activity such as, out of the ordinary photographing of animal or exhibitors, and questioning of a suspicious nature.
- In the event of potential animal activist activities, the following actions should be taken:

1. Exhibitors should contact department superintendent or another dept. official.
2. Exhibitor and attendants should remain calm and conduct business as usual.

Remember that the activist's goal is to draw attention and cause a disruption.

- The Fair and its participants are protected under Public Law 102-346 passed August 26, 1992, by U.S. 102nd Congress. Refer to Animal Enterprises Protection Act of 1992 - Section 43.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

A shared understanding between WSU Extension (4-H) and Agricultural Education, Washington FFA Association, exists to foster expanded participation and opportunities. The Evergreen State Fairgrounds supports and encourages both programs by adhering to the principles established as a code of ethics for participation. For your information, the following are Fair related components taken from the Memorandum of Understanding.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

AGRICULTURE EDUCATION

WASHINGTON FFA ASSOCIATION

And

WSU EXTENSION

4-H YOUTH DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

Concerning

4-H & FFA PROGRAM OPERATION IN WASHINGTON STATE

Agriculture Education/FFA and the 4-H youth development programs in the state of Washington are carried on for the purpose of promoting the maximum development of the members participating in these activities. We recommend that the following principles be considered a "code of ethics" for carrying on the two programs:

1. Agriculture Education teachers should encourage students to enroll and continue in the 4-H program.
2. County extension agents and adult volunteer leaders should encourage members to enroll in agriculture education classes available to them in their local secondary schools and to become members of the Washington FFA Association.
3. A member may participate in all judging or bowl division activities in FFA and 4-H, unless contests are held simultaneous, then the member must choose.
4. Members simultaneously enrolled in 4-H and FFA must carry separate and distinct projects or animals *during the same calendar year*. The program year is defined as October 1 to September 30. Both organizations desire to help in the education of youth. Involvement in both programs should result in doubling of the educational impact on the individual.
5. No member will be permitted to exhibit the same product or individual animal in both FFA and 4-H divisions. Inventory record proof of projects must accompany article/animal at time of entry at exhibit/fair event.
6. Publicity should reflect the contributions of each organization, giving the full story with respect to the contribution of both organizations when a joint contribution has been made in the development of the individual and their projects.
7. For the benefit of both organizations (4-H and FFA) separate division should be provided in all fairs in the state to eliminate competition between the members of the two organizations. Champions representing the two organizations will not be brought together in competition. However, when the situation in the community or a particular fair or youth show indicates that creations of a youth division (without 4-H and FFA identification) would be desirable, a single division may be organized with the agreement of the local agriculture teacher and FFA advisor, the county extension agents and show management, and with the concurrence of the state leaders in 4-H and FFA. Local fairs/shows may set up special rules and regulations for the management of that event; however, they must be in accordance with Memorandum of Understanding.

It is recommended that district or county meetings be held with agents and vocational agriculture and natural resources teachers periodically to discuss their roles and to determine local application. Frequent contact between the agents and teachers for mutual support and planning of leadership development programs are encouraged.

CRITERIA

- A permanent cloth (any fabric) banner, approximately 3 feet by 5 feet, suspended from doweling that extends beyond the banner fabric. May be single or double sided. Design may be stitched or glued; be sure appropriate moisture-proof glue is used.

DESCRIPTION

JUDGING

DEPARTMENT RULES:

ELIGIBILITY

- Entries are open to all Snohomish County 4-H members enrolled in a Horse Project by March 31st of the current year.
- CLOVERBUDS: In areas they are allowed to participate, are eligible for a 10-point participation ribbon only.
- Cloverbud members must be enrolled in a self-determined animal science project.
- All members exhibiting at the Fair must have judged, done a public demonstration, and shown an up-to-date Record Book to their Club Leader by July 19th. IT WILL BE THE RESPONSIBILITY OF EACH CLUB LEADER TO VERIFY.
- Any equine shown must be the member's registered project horse. A Horse Certificate must be on file with the Extension Office by June 1st of the current year. Hardship cases (such as death or injury of a project horse) may be exceptions to this rule, and members may be allowed to exhibit another horse with permission

of the Superintendent. Requests must be submitted in writing by August 16th to Superintendent, accompanied by a veterinarian's statement and completed Horse Certificate on the replacement horse. Applications available at Extension Office or on the Program Webpage. No premiums are paid on Hardship cases and do not qualify for State Fair.

- Exhibitors registering for Dressage, Western Dressage, Hunter Over Fences, Western Games, Driving, and Ranch Riding are required to have successfully completed a county level show in that discipline to qualify for Fair. For Hunter Over Fences, Western Games, and Driving this must be the same horse and exhibitor combination as exhibited at Fair. Exceptions may be granted on a case-by-case basis by the Superintendent.

CLASS ENTRY

- Entries, and Stall Reservations are due July 26th.
- "Prepare for Fair Workshop": will be scheduled for June date TBD (leaders are strongly encouraged to attend). Location and Zoom link will be posted on the horse program Facebook page <https://www.facebook.com/groups/SnohomishCO4HEquine/> and website; [Snohomish County 4-H Horse Program \(snoco4-hhorse.com\)](http://SnohomishCounty4-HHorseProgram(snoco4-hhorse.com))
- Class schedules and entry forms will be included in the Fair packet and posted on the Program Webpage and FB.
- Members will be paid for **nine premium-qualifying classes per section but may enter as many classes as they wish**: one Showmanship Class is required, and if riding in the Performance Horse Section, one Equitation Class must be entered. Showmanship and the top 8 classes will be paid premiums.
- Each handler may enter only one Showmanship Class with horse and exhibitor combination per section. EXCEPTION: if showing a Weanling, Yearling or Green Horse, member may also enter Showmanship with a finished horse.

VETERINARY SERVICE AND VET CHECK

- Should any horse or pony be refused admittance because of contagious condition, any horse or pony transported with the infected animal may also be refused admittance. The Superintendent and Veterinarian have the authority to inspect any animal on the grounds during the Fair and, in the event the animal is injured, sick or suspected of having a contagious disease, they have the authority to discharge any animal and send it home.
- No horse may enter the grounds except during Vet Check hours. ONCE A HORSE ENTERS A BARN AREA, IT MAY NOT LEAVE LOWER GATED AREA.
- HORSE CERTIFICATE OR DIGITAL COPY MUST BE SHOWN UPON ENTERING VET CHECK AREA.
- Stall cards will be issued at Vet Check for entrance to Barn. In order to get your horse in the barns, you must have a stall card signed by the veterinarian.
- The official ESF stall card must be used to describe all exhibits.
- It is strongly recommended that all horses be vaccinated against Influenza, Rhinopneumonitis and de-wormed within 6 weeks of the Fair. Tetanus vaccination and teeth checked in the last year are also recommended. Vaccination against Strangles should be considered for younger horses. We encourage you to consult your regular veterinarian regarding the health status of your horse prior to the Fair.

EXHIBITOR CLASSES

- A Body conditional Score of 4-7 is acceptable. Below or above will be excused.
- Requirements and judging criteria for all classes are found in Washington State 4-H Equine Rule Book, Snohomish County 4-H Horse Program Reference Guide and Groom Squad County Rules Copies of all rulebooks are available online and should be reviewed before entering any classes. In case of discrepancy between an official rulebook and the information in a member manual (which is intended as a general guideline only), the rulebook will prevail.
- Classes are offered only for those horses and ponies on exhibit; there will be no hauling in (horse brought in for only costume class, medals, etc.). Exception: Senior Recognition, Special Events during Draft Shows as determined prior to Fair. To participate in non-premium classes, the horse must be part of the overall exhibit, be on display for the duration of their section, and be entered in at least one premium paying class. No project shall be shared without

- a certificate on file on approved project horse with record book completed for the project in question.
21. No premiums paid for Costume, or Groom Squad and/or Hardship cases.
 - a. Hardship cases and members participating via judging waivers will be reviewed and approved on a case-by-case basis by the Superintendent. Exhibitor must have completed a county level educational event for their application to be considered. Examples are Equine-a-Rama, Equine Science, Hippology, Horse Bowl etc. and are not eligible for State Competition and premiums.
 22. Championship for **ROUND ROBIN** Representative. The top 5 in Senior Performance Advanced and Regular Showmanship, Top Driving Showmanship and Top 5 Senior Western Games Showmanship will be invited to a Championship Class on Monday August 26th. All participants will receive a special award, and the Champion will represent the Horse Program in the Large Animal Round Robin Contest on Monday, August 26th. All participants in this Championship Class must be available for and willing to exhibit in the Round Robin Contest.
 23. No cross entry between W/J/T, Novice and Regular Classes in any one seat except Dressage Tests, see class lists.
 24. Green Horse:
 - a. A horse or pony entered as a Green Horse may not be shown in classes other than Green Horse classes, except for Trail-in-Hand, Dressage and Western Dressage Introductory and Training Level Tests and Ranch Riding. Green Horses are not allowed in Dressage Equitation.
 - b. Green Horse Pleasure classes will be offered. Green Horses may not enter any other Pleasure classes.
 25. No stallions will be shown except a colt of the current year.
 26. Age Divisions:
 - a. Seniors are 14 thru 18-years-old by October 1
 - b. Intermediates are 11 thru 13 by October 1
 - c. Juniors are 8 thru 10 by October 1
 27. Cloverbud Members: 5 thru 7 by October 1 (Eligible for participation ribbons only)
 - a. May exhibit only in Stick Horse Class and Clover Bud activities.
 - b. May give a demonstration; enter Horse Shop items, Horse Photography, and Informational Posters (Premiums paid)
 28. Novice Equitation, Novice Showmanship, Novice Pleasure, Novice Trail Classes, and Novice Equitation Pattern Classes will be offered.
 - a. Novices must not have won a blue Danish Ribbon in Regular Equitation or 3 blue Danish Ribbons in Novice Equitation.
 - b. Minimum class size: 3 members (if class does not fill, members may be asked to ride in regular class but will be judged separately).
 - c. Members do not qualify for Championship Classes or State Fair.
 - d. Novice Equitation is not Medal Qualifying; however, Novice Classes are premium paying.
 - e. Members showing in Novice classes may **NOT** enter the corresponding regular classes.
 - f. Novice equitation riders may ride in Novice Pleasure classes.
 29. Walk/Trot/Jog Equitation, Walk/Trot/Jog Showmanship, Walk/Trot/Jog Pleasure, Walk/Trot/Jog Equitation Pattern Classes, and Walk/Trot/Jog Trail Classes will be offered.
 - a. Walk/Trot/Jog Riders are not yet capable of loping/cantering in a class situation and who have not yet won 4 Danish Blue Ribbons in County level Walk/Trot/Jog Equitation classes.
 - b. Members do not qualify for Championship Classes or State Fair.
 - c. Walk/Trot/Jog is not Medal Qualifying; however, Walk/Trot/Jog Classes are premium paying.
 - d. Members showing in Walk/Trot/Jog Classes may **NOT** enter any corresponding Novice or Regular Class or **ANY** Bareback Class.
 30. The Danish System is used for judging.
 33. Tack, attire and class requirements for all classes will be found in the WA State 4-H Equine Rule Book and Snohomish County 4H Horse Program Reference Guide.
 34. Safety Helmets are required whenever mounted (riding or driving).
 35. Any complaints in the horse area of any nature must be submitted in writing to the Horse Superintendents within 24 hours, accompanied by a \$25 fee. Any complaints to the Fair Board, Fair Management, or Extension Agent will be referred to the 4-H Fair Committee and Superintendents for handling at the completion of the Fair.
 36. All horses **MUST** remain in their stalls during draft horse show except for the scheduled classes and special events.
 37. All exhibits must be presentable to the public and on display in assigned area during public hours (exception: judging/showing and practice times).
 38. **STALL CARDS MUST BE COMPLETED**, including exhibitor name and show number as directed and be attached to the stall door when horse arrives. This is **REQUIRED!**
 39. **HORSES AND PONIES MAY LEAVE THE GROUNDS ONLY DURING DESIGNATED RELEASE TIMES FOR THEIR SECTION; PLEASE PLAN FOR HORSE TRANSPORTATION ACCORDINGLY.**
 40. It will be the responsibility of the club leader or a designated adult from each club to check stalls before their members take their horse's home. If stall is not thoroughly cleaned, premium money for the participant will be forfeit.
 41. No more than two 4-H members may be in stall at any one time.
 42. **Stall doors are to be closed and always secured when a horse is in the stall, free or tied. No exceptions.**
 43. Stalls:
 - a. Cleaning & care of stall is the responsibility of the exhibitor.
 - b. Must be kept clean.
 - c. Dirty shavings are to be dumped in designated bins located behind barn.
 - d. Water dumped in designated areas, not in the barn.
 44. Halter and lead rope must be attached to every stall door when horse is in stall overnight.
 45. Do not padlock horse in stall.
 46. Do not tie horse in aisle – you must groom, saddle and bridle horse in stall.
 47. Do not wash horse in aisle or stall. There are outside wash racks at the upper barns; bring your own hose. Clean up manure after using wash racks.
 48. Apply hoof polish outside the building or inside the stall, **not in barn aisles**. Stand horse on a mat or piece of cardboard so hoof black does not get on the pavement.
 49. Tack trunks may be left in aisle overnight; however, valuables should be locked in a safe place.
 50. Approved slow feed hay nets / bags are allowed.
 51. Each stall must have a horse ID sign and an educational poster. Details on these are included in the online Fair Packet.
 52. No horse or pony will be ridden above a walk at any time on the grounds except within the designated area and with proper equipment.
 - a. Bridle must be worn. Halter may not be used as a bridle.
 - b. Rider/Handler must always wear appropriate riding boots when riding.
 - c. No riding double.
 53. No horses allowed in walkway between the flowerbeds and barn.
 54. No person other than designated fair staff may approach the judge until after the judging is completed for the entire section, and by appointment only and for information only, not to dispute his/her placing.
 55. Coaching of an exhibitor in a class (by parent, trainer, leader, adult or any person) is prohibited. Coaching in the warmup arenas is allowed, but only from the rail.
 56. 4-H Members only must handle the horse on exhibit. If an exhibitor needs assistance with grooming, tacking up, lunging, etc., this should be done by another 4-H member. Parents, trainers, leaders or other adults are not allowed to ride, groom, lunge, or otherwise handle an animal on 4-H exhibit. The purpose of the 4-H Horse Exhibit is to demonstrate what the member has accomplished with his/her animal and to promote teamwork and cooperation among members. Adults may assist only by holding a horse only. Exceptions are made in cases where safety is a concern (e.g., checking/tightening the girth/cinch for a Junior or leading a horse if a rider is having control issues)

BARN / GROUNDS REGULATIONS

31. **FIRE MARSHAL REQUIREMENTS-** No overnight sleeping in barns allowed; No spreading shavings in aisle-ways or outside of stalls.
32. Horse Superintendents and other designated Fair show officials shall have the authority to make decisions regarding management of the 4-H Fair Horse Exhibit. Their decision will be final.

57. Overnight Camping:
- Overnight camping is available and is arranged thru reservation form on-line at Evergreenfair.org.
 - All 4-H members must be accompanied by a responsible adult if spending the night and must be back in the camping area by 10:30pm.
58. Tack stalls will be assigned to each club for storing tack, wheelbarrows, etc. Tack stalls must be decorated, and the contents screened from view.
59. Lunging in designated areas only.
60. For livestock trailer parking information, refer to LIVESTOCK INFORMATION at the front of this book.

EXHIBITOR CONDUCT

- Any exhibitor or adult displaying unacceptable conduct (i.e., profane language, dress code violation or abusive treatment) may, at the discretion of Superintendent and Fair management, be dismissed and jeopardize awarding of points/premiums and State Fair.
- All persons exhibiting animals must participate in Herdsmanship. Refer to Herdsmanship scorecard in 4-H Awards section in front of this book. 4-H program parents and leaders may direct but not participate in the care or cleaning of animals, pens, or stalls except at checkout times.
- Abuse of horse by any person is forbidden and will result in barring the offender from participation and loss of premiums.
- Dress code regulations are outlined in the front of this book. These rules are strictly enforced for safety reasons.

ANIMAL ACTIVIST ALERT

- At all times exhibitors shall be aware of suspicious activity such as, out of the ordinary photographing of animal or exhibitors, and questioning of a suspicious nature.
- In the event of potential animal activist activities, the following actions should be taken:
 - Exhibitors should contact department superintendent or another dept. official.
 - Exhibitor and attendants should remain calm and conduct business as usual.
 Remember that the activist's goal is to draw attention and cause a disruption.
 - The Fair and its participants are protected under Public Law 102-346 passed August 26, 1992, by U.S. 102nd Congress. Refer to Animal Enterprises Protection Act of 1992 - Section 43

NON-PREMIUM CLASSES

1. COSTUME CLASSES

- Rider must wear approved boots if using a saddle in costume. All costumed riders must wear an ASTM/SEI-approved helmet.
- Each horse and exhibitor will have an escort present for safety reasons due to the safety issues surrounding costume classes in the past. Classes may be combined at the discretion of the show committee.
- General Costume / Group Costume:** shown at a walk and judged primarily on creativity and general appeal. Use your imagination but keep it safe! NO carts, no standing or kneeling on the horse allowed.
- Not open to Cloverbuds members. No hauling in for this class, only horses on exhibit may participate. Classes may be combined.

2. VERSATILITY - Shown Western to English

(Not open to Novice or Walk/Trot)

Exhibitors and horses are shown in Western and English attire and tack. All tack/attire changes are to be made in the ring. Two grooms (4-H Members) are allowed to assist in changing for the second phase. Safety will be judged, and speed is not a consideration. Horses must stand quietly. Judging is based on 70% performance, 20% conformation and 10% appointments.

3. CLOVERBUD MEMBER STICK HORSE WORKSHOP AND EXHIBIT

Materials will be provided for Cloverbuds members and potential new members to make a stick horse. Older 4-H members are requested to help with the workshop on Sunday, August 24 at noon. A Stick Horse Performance Class will be on Sunday, August 29th location and time TBA. Members may also make a stick horse at home and participate in the class.

4. FUN GAMES – We will be providing fillers for the Draft Horse Show again and games may include Musical Buckets, Pie Eating Contest, Ride-a-Buck, Water Races, Simon Says and Red Light / Green Light, Team Ribbon Race and many more.

5. GROOM SQUAD – must pre-register by August 14th

Divisions:

Senior Team - State Qualifying. (All Senior Team)

Mixed Team – may be more than one age group.

Novice Team – no team member has won 4 Blue Danishes in Groom Squad.

- Sunday August 17th – 12:30pm. (see pre-registration form)
- Not open to Cloverbuds members.
- County Rules are available online.
- A release form signed by the owner must accompany each horse or pony.
- Each team must bring a gentle horse or pony with hooves in good condition for use by another team. Teams bringing a horse or pony with lice, ringworm, etc., will be disqualified. Teams bringing an unruly animal will be penalized 10 points and will be required to groom and show the horse themselves.

6. Senior Recognition – Senior Performance and the Wester Games Section will both have a special ceremony to recognize our Horse Program Members who have completed their 4-H career either by becoming ineligible due to age OR graduated from High School and not able to attend the next year's Fair due to College or other plans. This opportunity is available only one year so if plans change and the member does attend Fair, they will not participate a second time. Members are invited to display a poster highlighting their 4-H Years and submit a maximum 200-word essay that will be read during the ceremony.
